Executive Director. Our goals include expanding programs, increasing collaborations, enhancing the volunteer experience and cultivating donor support. In this issue of Scene and Herd you'll learn about our recent initiatives that help us achieve those goals.

As I reflect on last year's accomplishments, they can always be traced to donor and volunteer support. I spent much of the year planning my first Barn Dance. As it is our signature fundraiser, we rely on its success to meet the demand for our innovative equine activities and therapies. Because of your support, we raised \$360,000 to improve the lives of children and adults with special needs! A highlight of the night was watching the hands fly during the "Horse Power" appeal after we shared an emotional video featuring the success of one of our longtime riders, Kendra Johnson. There wasn't a dry eye in the arena and the appeal successfully funded the annual costs to care for our expanded herd of 14 horses.

As a way to introduce new people to the healing that happens here every day, last year we launched Young Professional Strides, a group charged with cultivating ambassadors among local young professionals. Their inaugural event held last fall, Hole Masters for Horses,

welcomed 100 people to our campus for a corn hole tournament and food truck sampling. I am really looking forward to seeing more from this growing group of go-getters in 2019.

We also had a little fun with creative fundraising competitions on social media which included everything from horse kicks for donations to voting for your favorite horse. The donations were tallied and you named Bear the 2018 Horse of the Year! Thanks for playing along.

As I look ahead at 2019, I am excited to work with our diverse, growing board of directors and new team members to continue this momentum. That includes bringing back our crowd-pleasing fundraiser, the Kentucky Derby Party, this Spring! It has been a wild ride so far learning, growing and serving our donors, riders and families. Together, let's make 2019 one of our best!

VOCATIONAL TRAINING PROGRAM EXPANDS, HELPS BLAZE A TRAIL FOR INCLUSION

Through a new collaboration with STARability Foundation™, young adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities are receiving experiential vocational training and life skills learning at NTRC through the non-profit's Trailblazer Academy. The academy is a full time, post high school transition program designed to teach job skills applicable to other organizations and responsibility with the goal being to help participants gain part time employment and long term independence.



Built on community partnerships with a variety of local businesses, the program gives participants exposure to the world of work and allows them to experience diverse jobs and businesses as well as discover

how they can contribute through their unique abilities. The social interactions, confidence building, peer support, and teamwork enhance the experience and connect them to the community.

Several days a week, these trailblazers arrive at NTRC in their official blue uniform t-shirts ready to roll up their sleeves and tackle the day's tasks which can include cleaning the stalls, sweeping the barn, grooming and exercising the horses as well as doing laundry. The win-win program provides NTRC with dedicated, free labor while teaching participants valuable on-the-job training in an environment where they feel welcome, comfortable and appreciated. Their sense of accomplishment and pride is visible not only on their faces, but in the spic and span barn after they leave.

The Trailblazer Academy launched in September 2016, with NTRC being the very first community partner worksite. The popular program has had a wait list since it started and will expand this year to three groups of 10-13 people. If you see a sea of blue shirts working hard on our campus, be sure to give them a proper NTRC welcome and thank them for their hard work!

VINCENT MILOT SPONSORS A HORSE TO HELP OTHERS GAIN INDEPENDENCE



I imagine I have a unique perspective on why I support NTRC. I am from Miami where I worked as an airline mechanic. I enjoyed an active lifestyle coming back and forth to Naples on fishing trips. I even rode horses as a teenager.

But when I was 35, life as I knew it changed forever when I was involved in a freak accident. I fell just two feet and crushed my spinal cord. I became paralyzed from the waist down. I know what it is like to depend on someone else, to need help and not have it.

I first heard about NTRC six years ago from my investment advisor, Dawn Litchfield, who is an active volunteer. She thought the mission was a good fit for my charitable giving, so I attended a Barn Dance. There, I learned how being with a horse is therapy for people like me. I was able to see the results in action and became determined to help if I could. Since then, I try to give a little each year because I believe what comes around goes around. People helped me when I needed it and I want to give back that same way.

On the horses, the kids can forget they are disabled. They get to be free with the horse's help. I like how the horses are also given a second chance so, this year I made the commitment to sponsor a horse for five years. I sponsored Tacoma because I liked her spots and heard she was great with kids.

ONE RIDER MAKES A CAREER OUT OF GIVING BACK

I started riding when I was six and continued for 11 years. I've literally grown up here. I owe so much of my success to NTRC and the people who support this wonderful place. Now at 25, my NTRC journey has taken me into a new and exciting direction, and I could not be more excited about the opportunities that await.

Let me back up. I was born with cerebral palsy which comes with many physical challenges including stiff muscles exaggerated movements and a lack of coordination that left me unable to walk independently. Once I found NTRC, I fell in love with the horses and became determined to walk on my own. At first, I didn't have the core strength to hold myself up while mounting. The exercises helped me build physical strength and I quickly became unstoppable! I've been walking on my own ever since.

The self-confidence and appreciation I developed for NTRC sparked a passion in me for giving back. In elementary school, I donated my horse Dottie to NTRC. When she got colic, I opened a lemonade stand to raise funds for her care. As a teen, I volunteered as a counselor at the summer camp.

That leads me to today. After earning my degree, I was ready to start my professional career. When I heard about the opportunity to work at NTRC as a database administrator, I jumped at the chance.

I'm very fortunate to have had NTRC in my life then and now. Having this job is repaying the favor that was given to me. Like our donors, I want to give kids with challenges a place to grow, have fun and be a building block for the rest of their life. It will be a privilege working alongside donors to further the important mission of this very special place. Giving back makes the world go around!
