As we turn our focus to the future, in order to care for our horses and staff who in turn are (finally) able to care for our participants once again, we are looking forward to making our first-ever Barn Dance Appeal a huge success. DONOR SUPPORT CRITICAL TO GET RIDERS BACK IN THE SADDLE

NTRC faced many challenges after the coronavirus pandemic forced programs to temporarily suspend in March. As we worried about financial uncertainty, how to retain our dedicated staff and care for our horses, and the wellness of our riders, we realized that with the unwavering support of our donors, NTRC can persevere.

With the arena and barn no longer abuzz with the smiling faces of riders and volunteers, the team got creative to stay connected, worked hard to prepare for a safe reopening and developed a new program to support the mental health of frontline workers.

Concern for riders' progress was a top priority. Instructors immediately began developing a series of exercise videos that riders could do from home to ensure they kept up their physical strength. Instructors spent extra time exercising the horses, so they too were ready to work when riders returned. To lift up spirits, NTRC hosted our first-ever, drive through campus horse parade in April. The team worked tirelessly to create and implement new safety protocols. Once volunteers were trained, programs slowly began resuming in July with limited group sizes.

Realizing the toll the pandemic was having on first responders, in August, NTRC launched a new mental health and wellness group for Healthcare Heroes with the help of mental health professional, Lourdes Araujo, our newest team member. By September, all of our programs were fully operational.

Throughout these difficult last few months, donors ensured NTRC had the funds to continue the expert care of our horses – costs that remain steady whether programs are running or not – and supported our mission from afar despite canceled fundraisers. For that we are eternally grateful.

SWINGING WITH PURPOSE™ GOES VIRTUAL WITH GOLF RAFFLE

For the third year in a row, Swinging With PurposeTM (SWP) has continued its investment in NTRC's equine programs for vulnerable women, girls and children in Southwest Florida. SWP grants have helped fund the equine groups for participants from PACE Center for Girls and Shelter for Abused Women and Children – both also SWP beneficiaries.

SWP hosts various annual golf fundraisers to fund their grantmaking program. When COVID-19 hit, they, like NTRC and many other charities, had to cancel critical fundraisers and get creative in order to continue their great work. When the Liberty Mutual Invitational, SWP's signature event scheduled for May, had to be canceled, they had to find alternate ways to continue their mission.

They reached out to two of their biggest supporters, golf Hall-of-Famers Jack Nicklaus and Nancy Lopez, who personally signed priceless golf memorabilia to be raffled virtually in July. A limited number of tickets were sold and the proceeds benefited NTRC and Valerie's House – also one of our valued community partners. NTRC and Valerie's House worked together to help promote the fundraiser and host the virtual raffle drawing.

NTRC received a much-needed \$7,000 donation from the raffle proceeds. We are so grateful for SWP's continued support during these trying times and for our donors who bought raffle tickets. Congratulations to the raffle winners Stonebridge Men's Invitational Group and Dawn Melvin.

Barn Dance Debuts as an Appeal with Virtual Elements Amid COVID-19 Safety Concerns

For the first time in the 15-year history of our wildly popular Bootstrap Boogie Barn Dance, NTRC made the difficult decision to convert our signature fundraiser to an online appeal. Because the Barn Dance gathers more than 500 of our supporters, due to health and safety concerns as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, we felt it was the right thing to do, until it is safe to gather and celebrate together.

Revenue from the Barn Dance, our largest annual fundraiser, supports the annual operating costs to care for the horses, staff and provide rider scholarships. Last year's event raised over \$568,000. Our goal for this year's appeal is \$350,000.

Funds raised through the appeal are important now more than ever due to the lack of program revenue and loss of fundraising income as a result of having to postpone programs and cancel fundraisers for five months during stay-at-home measures. Donations towards the appeal will be accepted through November 14, 2020, culminating in a virtual Pony Pie Bingo game when the winner will be announced on FaceBook. Pony Pie Bingo is a fan favorite at the Barn Dance and an element the committee wanted to keep as part of the new format.

The appeal includes a variety of donation levels starting at the Horse Power level of \$50,000. Donations can offer strength, hope, empowerment, encouragement and compassion to the more than 800 participants who rely on NTRC's innovative, evidence-based, equine-assisted programs for health, wellness and healing. The appeal also includes several fund-a-need categories where supporters can direct donations specifically to sponsor a rider, horse or barn cat – each with varying levels of associated costs.

Longtime supporters Gary and Connie Sharpe have already stepped up with a matching gift to leverage the impact of the Barn Dance Appeal giving. They will match up to \$50,000 raised through the appeal.

"HIDDEN THERAPY" HAS BRAYDEN GROWING STRONGER

I first noticed Brayden only using his right hand when he was four months old. After insisting that something was wrong, the pediatrician finally determined that he had a mild stroke in utero. The stroke affected the muscles on the left side of his body making them tight and weak.

Brayden has always loved horses. When his physical therapist referred him to NTRC three years ago, we couldn't wait to get started. Riding and Jiu Jitsu are now his only "hidden therapies".

Riding helps strengthen his core and balance and makes him more aware of using his left hand. He can now mount a horse more independently and he's working on riding without the assistance of a volunteer leading. These new skills helped him get his dream ATV on his 10th birthday because he can mount and drive it independently.


