

# Donor Dollars at Work

#### VINCE MILLOT INVESTS IN NTRC NOW AND INTO THE FUTURE

For the last ten years, Vince Millot has been a dedicated supporter. In addition to attending a Barn Dance and supporting the capital campaign, Vince began his long-term annual investment in our program by sponsoring a horse. He sponsored Tacoma for five years and now sponsors Delta. His \$12,000 annual sponsorship funds Delta's customized nutrition and feeding plan, conditioning, exercise, and training routine, farrier costs, and dental and veterinarian visits.

But Vince and his investment advisor Dawn Litchfield, a longtime NTRC volunteer and supporter, didn't stop there. She encouraged him to name the NTRC endowment as an irrevocable beneficiary of his annuity. So that Vince could see his gift at work during his lifetime, we recently unveiled the new Vince Millot Sensory Trail near the CFF Building and round arena, and held a dedication with our board members.

A sensory riding trail is a rich learning environment that consist of turns, varied footing, natural sights and sounds, and man-made activity stations. This integrated environment challenges the riders' balance, stimulates their senses and encourages them to interact with the world around them. Activities on the Vince Millot Sensory Trail include: a bean bag board for throwing bean bags into holes, large PVC pipes to drop balls down, a little barn to open the doors and get objects out of, and two chutes to drop golf balls down and race. A fan favorite is the "car wash" with hanging noodles that riders ride through. There is also a bridge to show riders how when a horse goes up and down a hill the rider can adjust their weight by leaning forward or backward to help the horse.

Sensory trails can be used to support riders with sensory processing issues or to help develop motor skills, balance, hand-eye coordination and spatial awareness. Sensory-processing challenges can influence the social, emotional, and cognitive functioning of individuals. By helping riders develop motor planning and appropriate responses to sensations, they can then perform in a more functional manner throughout everyday life.

## Meet a Rider by Dana McGourty, Carter's mom

CALM, COOL AND CONFIDENT... ON AND OFF THE HORSE

Carter is a very active, social 12-year-old boy who loves movies, theme parks, swimming and horses. He has come a long way and made enormous strides in his life thanks to the weekly therapeutic riding lessons he has been doing at NTRC for the last seven years.

We noticed early on that Carter had a speech delay. When he was three, he was diagnosed with low muscle tone and sensory issues. We sprang into action putting him in every program we could find that would help. We learned about NTRC through occupational therapist Mary Fellenz.

From the very first lesson, Carter had no fear and gravitated to the horses. He is very comfortable and relaxed around them. At first he slouched on the horse, but now he sits up tall which has helped his muscle tone. He is much more trusting of the horse now. He can steer and command them which improved his self-confidence and communication skills off the horse. Riding also really helps with his anxiety. After a long and sensory filled day at school, when Carter gets on the horse it completely calms him. When he is calm, the whole family is calm and that spills over into our home life. Carter also participated in the summer camps for several years. Now a confident rider, his favorite part was the horse show because he could show off his horsemanship and smile for the camera!

For a child who once struggled to find the words, there is no stopping Carter now. He's been asked to tap into his love for movies and become the official NTRC reporter where he will interview fellow riders. We are so proud grateful for the opportunities NTRC offers.

## **Donor Spotlight**

#### MEDICAL COMMUNITY COMES TOGETHER TO CARE FOR OUR HORSES

The NTRC herd consists of older horses. They are safe and sound-minded animals who serve our unique clients. Along with their age, comes the discomforts of aging in the joints. Caring for our horses' special medical needs is our number one priority.

"Inflamed joints can be painful in the horse. If not addressed, this may progress to arthritis," said Jennifer Williams, NTRC Equine Operations & Property Director. "The inflammation can break down the cartilage which could result in permanent damage and chronic pain."

Advancements in medicine and veterinarian care have provided a unique opportunity for our partners in the medical community to support NTRC. We are blessed to have three partners utilizing cutting edge technology and products to support our horses. They not only donate products, but also their time.

Through a partnership with Zoetis Equine, a leading worldwide health company providing products that prevent, detect and treat equine disease, and our local, long-term veterinarian partner, Van Roekel and Associates Inc, they are providing a new technology to help relieve pain and promote healing for our hardworking herd.

Zoetis, Dr. Harvey and other veterinarians from Van Roekel's and Associates used the Pro-Stride APS regenerative medicine device to ease discomfort in the herd's joints. The technology uses the horse's own natural healing properties to restore joints with natural anti-inflammatories and healing growth factors produced from the horse's own blood. Seven NTRC horses are currently being treated with this technology.

Arthrex Inc., a leading global orthopedic medical device manufacturer headquartered in Naples, Florida, has for the last decade applied their expertise in orthopedics and orthobiologics to develop hundreds of products for the treatment of large and small animals through Arthrex Vet Systems. Through our partnership with Arthrex and Dr. Hank Gendron, they donate IRAP, a natural treatment used to treat mild to moderate osteoarthritis in horses. The substance used in IRAP is made from white cells in the horse's bloodstream. The cells are stimulated to produce regenerative and anti-inflammatory proteins without the addition of drugs.

"We currently alternate between the IRAP and Prostride treatments to compare and see what works best for our horses," added Jennifer. "NTRC and our horses are incredibly grateful for these partnerships and their investments in our herd health."
